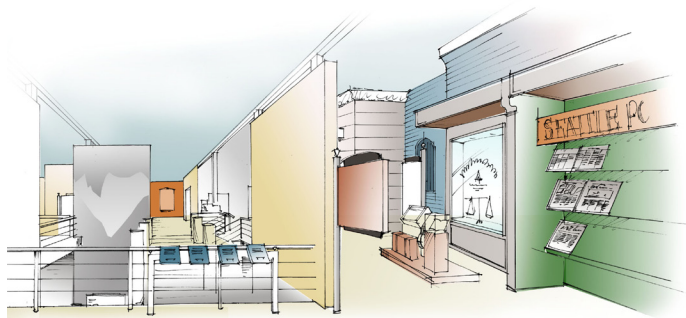
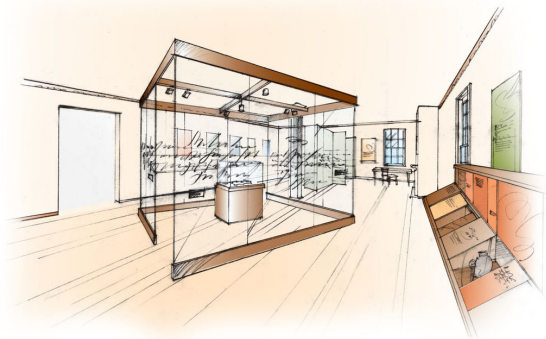

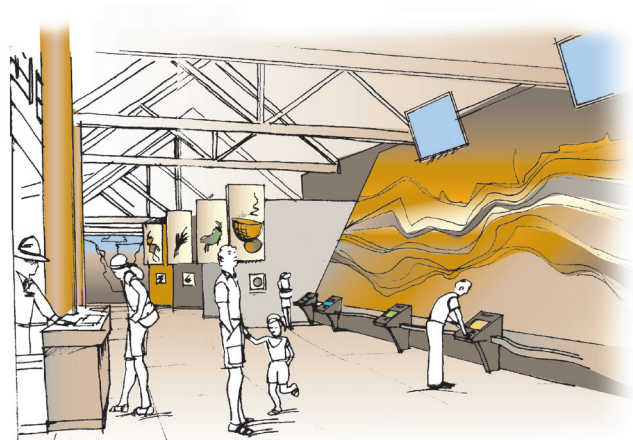


Interactivity

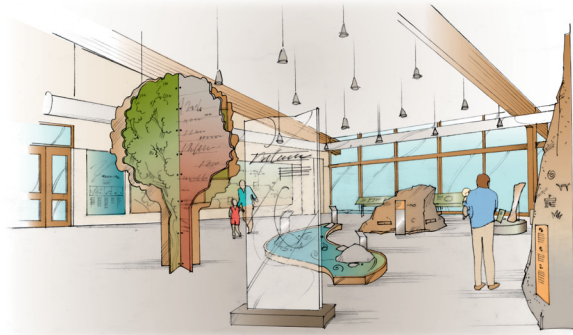
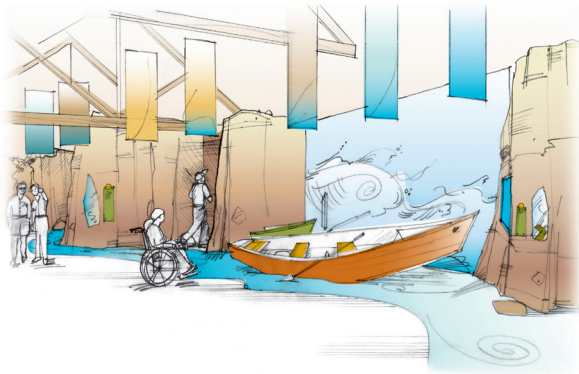
Sustainability

Stories old and new deserve a fresh approach. We look for striking and original solutions that beckon people in, move them to explore, and keep the enthusiasm brewing after they leave.

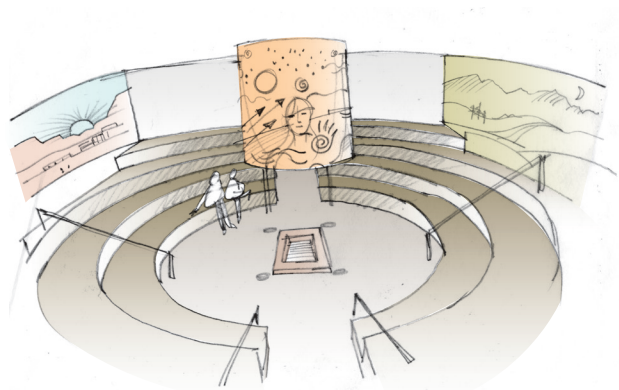


Accessibility

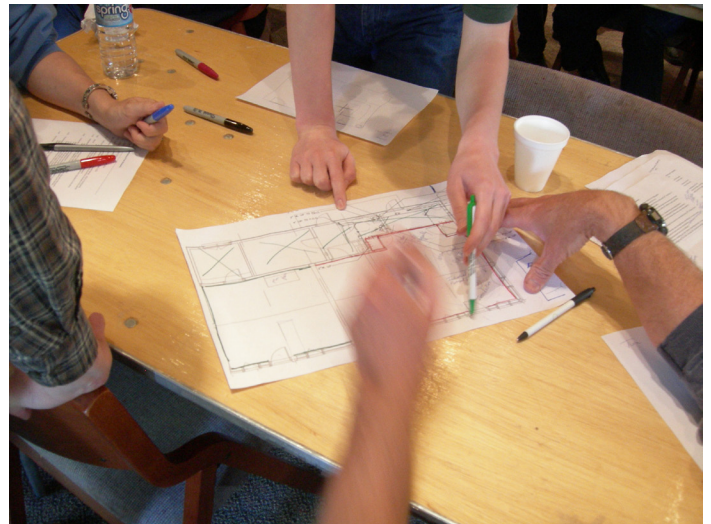
